Katara Masjid

Gandhi's Three Monkeys" statue

Strolling in the Katara Cultural Village, a beacon for cultural exchange, one will come across a three-part sculpture of three heads in military gear depicting one in a gas mask, a soldier, and the other in a hood. Each art piece, which tackles the challenging themes of war and peace, are made up of cooking instruments, used pails, traditional Indian lunch boxes, and glass bowls. Holistically, the public art is inspired by Mahatma Gandhi's visual metaphor of the three wise monkeys which represents the proverb 'see no evil, hear no evil, speak no evil.



Amphitheatre

The gem of the cultural village, the Katara Amphitheatre is a crafted balance between the classical Greek theatre concept and the everlasting Islamic features. It stands firm in the heart of Katara, under the clear blue sky, overlooking the radiant blue sea. Completed in the year 2008, this 3,275 sqm landmark, pays tribute to the great tradition of the unique architectural style associated with amphitheatres and is set to host some of the most spectacular world-class events in Doha.



Golden Mosque

The Golden Masjid was garnished with extremely small golden chips, and it represents Ottoman style. Katara also organizes advanced courses in Quran memorization that are widely attended by a considerable number of children from different age groups. Such courses bear significance because they instill the virtuous values and the good manners of the Holy Quran.



Pigeon Towers

Known as The Pigeon Towers, the intricate design of these structures date back thousands of years and mirror traditional Islamic architecture and creativity. While the towers provide housing to thousands of pigeons, they have a very practical purpose.



Katara Plaza

The Commercial Plaza forms the “heart” of the Katara Project and consists of retail areas, cafés, restaurants, hotels and outdoor dining. The Commercial Plaza is designed in classical roman architectural form complete with classical orders, building elements, ornamentation, motifs etc. All construction has been carried out using marble & natural stone.

Horse Stable

Souq Waqif Royal Stable is one of the main attractions where the tradition of equestrian excellence has been proudly presented to the general public. Visitors can see well-groomed Arabian horses up close at these stables not far from the Falcon Souq. Visitors can walk around and take photos of the horses in their open pen.



Camel Pen

The camel pen at Souq Waqif in Doha, Qatar, features a traditional setup where visitors can observe camels up close. It showcases these majestic animals in a spacious, sandy enclosure, reflecting the region's cultural heritage. The pen is a popular attraction, offering a glimpse into the Bedouin way of life.



Falcon Souq

For a glimpse of Qatari heritage, one shouldn't miss the Falcon Souq. One has to see the scale of the market, afforded its own traditional arcaded building off Souq Waqif, to understand the place of falconry in Qatari society.



Spices, Dry Fruits, Handicrafts, Textiles and Perfumes market

Vibrant stalls display aromatic spices and exotic dry fruits, while intricate handicrafts and colorful textiles showcase traditional artistry. The perfume section invites visitors to explore a variety of captivating scents, reflecting the region's cultural depth.



Art Center

The building is of traditional architecture already from the exterior. It's well known for its atmosphere and for seeing artists, mainly painters, at work. Naturally it is also a place to go shopping for art.

National Museum of Qatar



The National Museum of Qatar represents the crown jewel of Qatari culture, and its design reflects the Qatari identity; as it combines features of authenticity and modernity. Its designer, the prestigious French architect Jean Nouvel, wanted this exquisite architectural masterpiece to take the form of interlocking discs inspired by the desert rose, which evokes the lifestyle of the Qatari people between the sea and the desert
